The next election of Parent Governors will therefore be held during the 2023/2024 school year when the present Board will be reconstituted.

The Governors responsible for...

The school continues to be indebted to the Governors who willingly give of their time to ensure the administration of Kirkistown Primary School proceeds smoothly and effectively.

The Governors wish to record formally their appreciation of the work carried out by the teaching and non-teaching staff of the school. The Governors appreciate the dedication and expertise of the staff, who each play their part in helping to make Kirkistown Primary School a successful school.

Financial Information

The total budget share allocated to this school for the financial year 2022/23 was £292,748. The budget allocation is based on pupil numbers reported in the annual school census taken in October of the previous school year, size of premises and other factors such as the number of pupils receiving free school meals.

The school's 3-year financial plan had predicted that school would finish 2021-2022 with a deficit of £73,395 but LMS confirmed the actual figure was £72,223.

PTFA

We have a vibrant and very supportive PTFA who have helped raise vital funds for the School. Events organised throughout the year included a Halloween Pumpkin Party, Christmas Fair, Valentine Disco.

Shared Education Programme

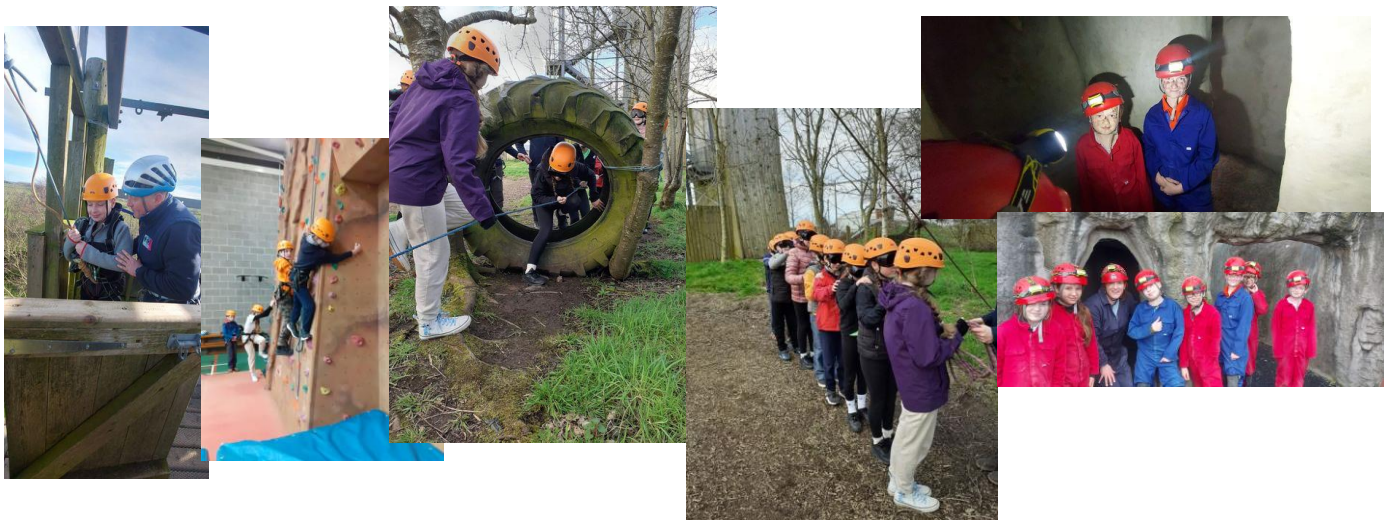
Kirkistown Primary School continues to participate in a very successful Shared Education Signature Project with our partner school St Patrick's Primary School, Ballygalget. During March 2023 pupils from Primary 2 to Primary 7 had opportunities to visit each other to learn together in the classroom. Pupils participated in 'get-to-know-you' sessions as well as practical PDMU lessons.

Primary 7 Children

We wish our Primary 7 pupils every happiness and success as they move on to post-primary school. Staff from these post-primary schools visited the transferring pupils in the final weeks of this academic year with familiarisation visits being organised also.

Once again, the Primary 7 children were a credit to the school, taking an active role in school life through the School Council, House Captain roles and the Buddy System.

Pupils enjoyed a residential trip to Ganaway Activity Centre in March 2023. They experienced many activities such as archery, climbing wall, high ropes, laser tag, caving, beach scavenger hunt, beach art and to finish they toasted marshmallows and made smores over a campfire.



A Primary 7 Leavers' Assembly was held on Wednesday 28 June 2023 to mark the closing of the school year and to say goodbye. The leavers event was an opportunity to pay tribute to the role the Primary 7 children played in the life of the school and to celebrate their growth as individual members of our society. Children sang songs, read original poems and shared memories. The event was followed by a PTFA run Leavers' Pizza Party and Disco. Primary 7 pupils enjoyed the pizza themselves but everyone in school was invited to the disco. Pupils played party games and Miss Taggart was DJ. The PTFA provided an 'ice-cream factory' complete with toppings plus juice and donuts for good measure!

Curriculum

Communication

Priority Areas (2022-23):

- Develop a range of strategies to improve and maintain phonic and spellings

- Identify children requiring specific TPP's and provide opportunities for additional withdrawal sessions.
- Maths Recovery training for Co-ordinator. Further collaboration through Cluster groups.



Play Based Learning

- Introduce and implement FS observation training from Clare Devlin in Cluster Group meetings 21/22.
- Develop beach school resources and organise an outdoor activity resource and storage area.

- We are committed to a preventative, responsive and restorative anti-bullying ethos across the whole school.
- We value the views and contributions of children and young people. We will actively seek these views and we will respect and take them into account.
- We understand that everyone in our school community has a role to play in taking a stand against bullying and creating a safe and welcoming environment for all.

In November 2022 all our pupils participated in Friendship Week.



Health Education

Forest School

As part of our curriculum, we continue to take advantage of our wonderful **seaside setting** and **learning outdoors** when we can.

SEN Support

Kirkistown Primary School is an inclusive school and seeks to ensure all pupils fulfil their potential.

During the academic year Ms Rudewicz attended training sessions as part of her professional development:

- Primary SENCO Induction (Days 1, 2 & 3,4)
- EA Connect – Scheduling an Annual Review (EdIS)
- Personal Learning Plan (PLP) Procedures and Guidance Training

Staff are skilled at early identification of needs and strive to identify underachievement and low achievement, drawing on their professional judgement and the data available from classroom observations and from standardised scores. There continues to be a close liaison between the SENCo, Ms N Rudewicz, and staff preparing and reviewing Individual Education Plans (IEPs) in consultation with pupils and their families. Evidence is collected by the SENCo to help inform discussions with parents and to assist with the Annual Review process for children with a Statement of Special Educational Needs. School remains committed to providing a dedicated time in the week to allow teachers to work with children on the Special Educational Needs register on a 1:1 or small group basis.

There continues to be close liaison with the Educational Psychologist from whom advice was sought and referrals made. The team from RISE provided support this year for individuals. School continues to work closely with speech therapists, the AAIS Support Team and the EA Literacy Support Unit.

Children who appeared to be underachieving were also monitored with Targeted Progress Plans put in place to assist teachers to focus on areas for development to help pupils reach their full potential.

During the Autumn and Spring Terms, Mrs Cole was employed, using SEN Funding, to work with all pupils on the school's SEN register. These sessions were invaluable and allowed children dedicated weekly time to work with the SEN teacher on their IEP targets. In addition, children were able to work with their class teacher on a 1:1 or small group basis during the SEN hour each week.

Safeguarding

Child Protection procedures continue to be fully implemented and criminal background checks are carried out on all newly appointed staff and volunteers. Mrs Harbinson is the Designated Teacher for Child Protection and Mr Irwin is the Deputy Designated Teacher for Child Protection. All staff have updated child protection training biannually.

The School's Safeguarding Team is made known to children through information posters and termly assemblies with pupils reminded they may approach any teacher and in particular the Designated Teachers if they wish to discuss any concerns. Child Protection notices are displayed in prominent places around school and in every classroom. Families are kept informed of the team and have immediate access to important documents through the school website.

The schools Safeguarding Team' consists of Ms N Rudewicz (Principal), Mrs Harbinson (Designated Teacher), Mr Irwin (Deputy Designated Teacher), Mrs K Edgar (Chair of Governing Board) and Mrs J Jones (Designated Governor for Child Protection). Yearly reports are prepared as the relevant staff meet with the Designated Governor for Child Protection, Mrs Jones.

The pastoral care of our pupils remains central to the ethos of the school and all staff are committed to it. We aim to reassure our children their worries and concerns will be listened to sensitively and sympathetically. Worry boxes in Key Stage 2 classrooms encourage children to write their worries down and share their problems with the class teacher or the Designated Teacher who can deal with any concerns.

All staff attended an Anaphylaxis Training session in August 2022.

Substantial work was, again, undertaken on the preventative curriculum during the 2022-2023 academic year.

Preventative Curriculum work as follows:

- PDMU lessons being planned and delivered in each of the classes.
- Weekly celebration assemblies have restarted- promoting self-esteem and confidence in the children. Reception to Primary 7 meet together. Children have been reminded in Assembly who is part of the Safeguarding Team in School and who they can go to/ what they can do if they are worried about something.
- Buddy Team has been set up again after being unable to do it during Covid. Children from Primary 7 were able to apply for the post and then receive training. Ten children were successful in their application and have been members of the 'Buddy Team' all year in both the Foundation Stage class and the KS1 class.

- School 'House System' continuing to be used effectively throughout School, encouraging children to make good choices by following our six Golden Rules. Incentives, created by the school council, such as non-uniform days, park visit or 25p token to spend in the tuck-shop for the winning house each half term - all linked to our Positive Behaviour policy.
- School Council- elected representatives from each year group meet to discuss and make decisions together based upon ideas and opinions from their peers in class.
- Mental Health Week- 6-10th Feb 2023. All children participated in a variety of activities in each class related to caring for their mental health.
- Friendship week (Anti-bullying week)- held in November, children in each class reported back about what they had been doing and this content was shared via Facebook and the website.
- Fire Safety Awareness P5&P6 class- Local Fire Officers were again unable to attend school but they left children resources to explore different ways to Stay Safe.
- P3&P4 children participated in a whole school 'Beach Clean' on 7th June 23.
- A Harbinson & Steven Irwin delivered the 'Growing Up / Puberty' talks to children in P6&P7 (April 2023).
- Designated Teacher is the Period Dignity Champion for the school.
- Dog Trust Safety Assembly for the whole school on 19th April 23.
- REACH workshops are designed to support pupils to develop positive emotional health, increase their readiness for learning, and build their resilience. P3-P7 pupils participated in 6 Wednesday workshops from April-May 23.
- Cycling Proficiency training offered in Term 3 to children in Primary 6 and 7. Three children are currently completing the course.
- All children in P5-7 have the opportunity to attend Swimming lessons each Monday from April- June.
- DE 'Healthy Happy Minds project'- Five children have been able to access Talking Therapy and Counselling this year.

Security Arrangements

We continue to be ever mindful of the need to protect our children at all times when they are in school. Kirkistown Primary School operates a controlled access system throughout and visitors can only gain access when this is granted from staff members.

All visitors must sign in, receive the red identification tag and keep it on show if working on school premises. Volunteers wear a black identification tag highlighting their role while all staff wear a blue identification tag.

Buddy System

We continue to operate the 'Buddy System' in the playground.

Through looking after and caring for younger, more vulnerable children, older children learn the skills associated with empathy and compassion and create a caring ethos in the playground.

Younger children feel safe and cared for while the Buddies feel valued and respected.

Our Buddies are easily identified in the playground by their bright yellow vests.

School Council

One child from each year group (Primary 1 to Primary 7) continues to be elected by their peers- a total of 7 elected representatives that form the School Council. The Council aims to meet half termly and have a voice in school life.

Children were tasked with researching the views of their peers on the specialist subject teaching introduced this year. They were also asked to identify which articles from the *UN Rights' of a Child* to include in our new Absconding Policy.



House Captains

'Community' is important to us and our Positive Behaviour Policy reflects this. We seek to identify, spot and praise all the good things that happen around us because we recognise that these things don't happen accidentally.

Our House Captains set an example for our younger children by modelling good decision making and offering both praise and encouragement to others who do the same. We want and expect our children to be good citizens.

House points are awarded for displaying 7 very simple traits-

- 1- Being gentle with each other
- 2- Being kind and helpful
- 3- Listening well (to each other and to staff)
- 4- Being honest
- 5- For working hard
- 6- For looking after property (our own belongings, those of our friends and those belonging to school)
- 7- For completing homework to a good standard

Our House Captains are democratically chosen by their peers. They are responsible for totalling the weekly house points to see which house has won the weekly award. Our School Council decided the winning house, at the end of each half term, deserves a treat and suggested a Park Visit or Tuck Shop Treat (25p value) as the prize.
